Light shines through the darkness for the upright
-Psalm 112:4

THIS LITTLE LIGHT OF MINE

As children we sang the lively song *This Little Light of Mine*. The words, of course, are based on today's Gospel, in which we are called as disciples to be salt and light for the world. Children are uninhibited about sharing their faith. It's only when we grow older that we prefer to hide our light under a bushel basket because our culture tends not to emphasize discipleship.

The message in this week's readings is clear: in order to give glory to God through our discipleship, we must show the light of Christ in our words and deeds. Not an easy thing for inhibited adults. Often we may think of salt and light in terms of what we do for others, but it can be just as important not to do something, such as getting angry with the stranger on the road, or telling an offensive joke.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

When the custom of the stationary liturgies was revived in the city of Rome in the early days of the twentieth century, the papal liturgy for Good Friday was appropriately housed in the stationary church of *Santa Croce in Gerusalemme*, the Holy Cross of Jerusalem.

The church is off the tourist track today, but true pilgrims would never miss it. It stands on the grounds of the Sessorian Palace, the home of the Empress St. Helena, mother of Constantine. She dedicated her life to finding the true cross of Christ in Jerusalem, and desired to found a church in Rome for people who could not make the long and dangerous trip to the Holy Land. Eventually, it came to house relics of the cross.

When the pope fled the city of Rome for Avignon, the religious institutions of Rome collapsed and the church was abandoned. Centuries later it was given into the care of monks. Amazingly, it concealed a forgotten treasure. In 1492 repairmen took down a brick wall and discovered a niche with the inscription "Title of the Cross," and within, an ancient wooden tablet on which was carved the inscription dictated by Pilate for the cross of Christ in Hebrew, Latin, and Greek.

No one is certain that this is authentic, although its discovery was enough to give the church great prestige among pilgrims. The veneration of the relic of the cross located here was a factor in shaping our restored Holy Week.

CELEBRATING BLACK HISTORY MONTH

Black American Nurses

Thousands of black American girls have found careers in nursing. One out of every five black professional women is a nurse.

Estelle Massey Osborne

She opened the doors of the nursing profession to black Americans from 1921-1931. She was Instructor of Nursing in Harlem, and Lincoln Hospitals. She also served as Director of Freedmen's Nursing School in New York. In 1945 she became Instructor in the Department of Nursing at New York University. Estelle was chosen Nurse of the Year in 1959 by New York University's School of Nursing. The interest in nursing among black girls is still a popular and growing profession in this 21st century.

Lieutenant Colonel Margaret E. Bailey

She was an Army nurse who cared for American soldiers in many parts of the world. She was the highest ranking African American Army Nurse during her career.

POPE FRANCIS ON CONSECRATED LIFE

On October 28, 2016 Pope Francis addressed participants in the International Congress for the Episcopal Vicars and Delegates for Consecrated Life. Here is an excerpt from this address:

“The Consecrated Life is a spiritual capital which contributes to the good of the whole Body of Christ, and not simply that of the individual religious families. For this reason, I asked, and I ask again today, that pastors, and you, vicars and delegates for the consecrated life, accept it ‘readily and joyfully’ as a reality which ‘is at the heart of the church and as a decisive element of her mission, because it belongs absolutely to the life and holiness of the Church.’ Therefore I encourage pastors, and you along with them to show a special concern in promoting the different charisms in your churches, to be close to consecrated men and women, with tenderness and love and to teach the People of God the value of the consecrated life.”

The U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops announced that the World Day for Consecrated Life will be celebrated in the Church on February 2nd, and in parishes this weekend. The following prayer was published.

“God our Father, we thank you for calling men and women to serve in your Son’s kingdom as sisters, brothers, religious, priests, as well as members of secular institutes. Renew their knowledge and love of you, and send your Holy Spirit to help them respond generously and courageously to your will. We ask this through our Lord Jesus Christ, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, forever and ever. Amen”

MI PEQUEÑA LUZ

Cuando éramos niños cantábamos efusivamente la canción *Mi pequeña luz (This Little Light of Mine)*. La letra de la canción, desde luego, está basada en el Evangelio de hoy, en este estamos llamados como discípulos a ser la sal y la luz del mundo. Los niños no tienen dificultad para compartir su fe; solo es cuando crecemos que preferimos esconder nuestra luz bajo un tazón porque nuestra cultura tiende a no enfatizar el discipulado. El mensaje en las lecturas de esta semana es claro: para poder dar gloria a Dios por medio del discipulado, debemos mostrar la luz de Cristo en nuestras palabras y obras. No es algo fácil para adultos inhibidos. A menudo podemos pensar en la sal y la luz en términos de lo que hacemos por los demás, pero puede ser tan importante como el no hacer nada, ya sea como enojarse con un desconocido en la carretera o decir una broma ofensiva.

TRADICIONES DE NUESTRA FE

La primera santa americana fue Rosa de Lima, peruana de nacimiento. Murió en 1617 y fue canonizada en 1671, diez años después de la primera fundación inglesa en lo que hoy son Estados Unidos de América. Esta santa americana es acompañada por otros santos como san Felipe de Jesús (mexicano) canonizado en 1862 y Madre Francisca Cabrini (italoestadounidense y la primera santa de EE. UU.) canonizada en 1946.

Oficialmente hay 60 santos y 77 beatos que nacieron o trabajaron en América. La mayoría de estos son 50 mexicanos, 33 brasileños, 12 canadienses, nueve estadounidenses, ocho colombianos, siete peruanos, tres argentinos y tres chilenos. Guatemala, Cuba, República Dominicana, Uruguay y Venezuela tienen un santo(a) cada uno. Estados Unidos y Canadá comparten siete mártires. Es posible tener presión arterial alta sin síntomas aparentes, por eso a menudo se la llama "el asesino silencioso". Ven a la clínica y deja que una de nuestras enfermeras te ayude a controlar tu presión arterial.

¿Qué es la presión arterial alta?

Es una condición en la que la fuerza de la sangre pega contra las paredes arteriales es lo suficientemente alta como para que eventualmente pueda causar enfermedades del corazón. La presión arterial está determinada por la cantidad de sangre que bombea el corazón y la resistencia al flujo sanguíneo en las arterias. Cuanto más las bombas el corazón, y más estrecho son sus arterias, más alta su presión arterial. Usted puede tener la presión arterial alta durante años sin síntomas evidentes. No detectado y no controlado, esto aumenta el riesgo de daño a los vasos sanguíneos que conduce a graves problemas de salud, incluyendo ataque cardíaco y accidente cerebrovascular. Afortunadamente, su médico puede detectar fácilmente
