MORE THAN DISCIPLES

Each of today's four scriptural roles—disciple, prophet, apostle, herald—forms a facet of our life in Christ as we live it day by day. Isaiah tells us that a prophet is anointed, as we were anointed at our baptism in water and the Spirit, to bring glad tidings and to promote God's reign of healing, justice, and peace. An apostle, like Paul, is one who is "sent." Each of us, in his or her own way, is sent by Christ to be a voice of rejoicing, to encourage prophetic voices in the world, and to make sure that the work of the Spirit thrives. John the Baptist shows us the job of the herald, making the Lord's way straight, announcing the coming of the Light of the world.

Today we also hear from Mary, model disciple. Her song, the Magnificat, shows us the world we must believe in and work for: one in which God is praised, where God's favor is bestowed on the humble, where the hungry are filled and the rich are sent away empty, a world that continues to know and rejoice in the mercy of God that lasts for all ages.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

The tradition of anointing the sick with blessed oil is very old, but developed slowly and unevenly in the first eight centuries of the church's life. St. Augustine, who wrote volumes of homilies from his thriving church in North Africa, plus pastoral directives, letters, and memoirs, never mentions it at all. We know from ancient prayers that it did happen in Rome, Milan, Gaul, and the British Isles. In Rome the bishop blessed the oil of the sick, but it could be applied by a priest, deacon, or a layperson. It seems that sick persons could even anoint themselves. St. Genevieve of Paris was known for anointing the sick in her care.

Perhaps inevitably, complaints of abuses, and even trickery by sorcerers, brought an end to this consoling practice. In a dangerous world with a dispersed population, clerics may have preferred that this hands-on care was a lay privilege. The purpose of anointing, however, was not simply healing, but forgiveness of sin and an experience of saving power of Christ. By the year 800, dioceses everywhere were organizing rituals for priestly anointing. Although anointing of the sick is reserved to priests today, perhaps this treasured memory will enrich the future of the sacrament.

SIMBANG GABI

SIMBANG GABI is one of the most popular Filipino traditions. It is when Catholic churches across the nation begin a nine-day novena to the Blessed Mother. The novena begins December 15th and culminates with the “Misa de Gallo” to welcome the birth of our Savior Jesus Christ.

The origin traces its roots in Mexico when in 1587 the Pope granted the petition of Fray Diego de Sorio, to hold Christmas Mass outdoors as the Church could not accommodate the large crowd. During olden times the pre-dawn mass is announced by the ringing of the church bells.

The tradition of Simbang Gabi continues. It is a significant moment not only because it strengthens relationships among family members, but also because it is the time when our faith is intensified. It is a spiritual preparation for Christmas, the birth of Jesus Christ.

PASTORAL COUNCIL

OCTOBER —Profit & Loss Statement

Pastoral Council met Nov. 17, 2014, and welcomed new members, Ja'net Blea, Theresa Nartey and Phil De Leon. Thank you for accepting Fr. Joyle's invitation to serve on the Pastoral Council.

Fr. Joyle reported on the result of Prop. 47, which was approved by voters, Some counties are already implementing the new law. This proposition was supported by all the Bishops in California.

Dale Yamamoto reported that the Luau Dinner had a net profit of \$4,828 to be added to the Church's General Fund.

Fr. Joyle had a meeting with the Extraordinary Ministers of the Eucharist to explain the changes in the distribution of Holy Communion. These changes come into effect December 1, 2014. Fr. Joyle also will reiterate to the parishioners the correct way to receive the Body and Blood of Christ.

Fr. Joyle reported the Day of Remembrance was well attended.

The Knights of Columbus collected turkeys and non perishable food for the Annual Food Basket Giveaway. This year Food Link was unable to help, so we depended on the generosity of our parishioners to help fill the 250 baskets.

The Pastoral Council will sponsor a photo booth for Children and their families in this year's Christmas Fair to have their picture taken with Santa.

St. Paul Feast Day is January 17th. Beth Velasco is chairing this event.

Sister Kathy has been hired as our Part-time Youth Minister. New youth leaders were recruited and eager to start the New Year with Youth Day on January 1 2015.

Paul Pham suggested a Certificate of Appreciation be given to council members who have recently served and "retired" from the Council.

MAS QUE DISCIPULOS

Cada uno de los cuatro roles en las Escrituras de hoy — discípulo, profeta, apóstol, testigo— forma una faceta de la vida en Cristo que vivimos día a día. Isaías nos dice que el profeta es ungido, tal como fuimos ungidos en el Bautismo con agua y con el Espíritu, para traer la Buena Nueva y promover el Reino de Dios, un reino de salvación, justicia y paz. El apóstol, como Pablo, es un “enviado”. Cada uno de nosotros, a su manera, es enviado por Cristo a ser una voz de alegría, a animar las voces proféticas en el mundo y asegurar que prospere la obra del Espíritu. Juan Bautista nos muestra la labor del testigo, enderezando el camino del Señor, anunciando la venida de la Luz del Mundo.

Hoy escuchamos también a María, discípulo modelo. Su canto, el “Magnificat”, nos muestra el mundo en que debemos creer y por el cual laborar: uno en donde Dios sea alabado, donde el favor de Dios se derrama sobre los humildes, donde los hambrientos quedan repletos y los ricos se despiden vacíos, un mundo que continúa conociendo y celebrando la misericordia de Dios que perdura por todos los siglos.

TRADICIONES DE NUESTRA FE

Jesús proclama que Juan el Bautista es más que un profeta (Lucas 7:26) y lo compara con Elías, el profeta más importante de los judíos (Mateo 17:11-13). Pero, ¿qué es un profeta? El judaísmo, cristianismo e islamismo reconocen a ciertas personas como profetas. La palabra hebrea *nabi* significa portavoz, o profeta. Los *nebiim* eran encargados por Dios para una tarea especial. Así por ejemplo, Moisés fue encargado para liberar al pueblo de la esclavitud egipcia, Elías para recordarle la palabra de Dios cuando se apartaba de la alianza, y Jeremías para denunciar las corrupciones y anunciarle el castigo. Cuando tradujeron al griego el Antiguo Testamento, la palabra *nabi* fue traducida como *prophetes* (profeta). Esto indica un intérprete de la voluntad de Dios. Los profetas griegos eran oráculos que adivinaban el futuro, por lo cual mucha gente confunde al profeta con un adivino. El profeta según el cristianismo es un testigo (Juan 1:6-8, 19-28) del poder de Cristo y la palabra de Dios.

TRES ACONTECIMIENTOS IMPORTANTES

Esta gran solemnidad invita a la alegría y a la esperanza. Por otro lado, celebran con gozo que La Virgen María, Madre del Salvador; fue preservada del pecado original. Es purísima entre las mujeres. Al celebrar esta solemnidad en Adviento, anticipa con la Iglesia, llenos de esperanza la llegada del Mesías que ha de irradiar con su luz ante todas las naciones.

San Juan Diego: 9 de Dic.

La Iglesia nos presenta durante Adviento la celebración de Juan Diego. Y nos preguntamos ¿Qué tiene que ver Juan Diego con este tiempo litúrgico? Nada, pero si se convierte en un modelo de fe que podemos imitar. Su humildad ante el misterio de la visita que recibe y su anhelo de cumplir la voluntad de Dios hacen de este santo tan popular una inspiración que nos nutre durante este tiempo.

Nuestra Señora de Guadalupe: 12 de Dic.

Para América Latina, Nuestra Señora de Guadalupe es la Estrella de la Evangelización. Descubrimos en su historia y en su imagen el resplandor del Sol que nace de lo alto y que, a través de su Madre, María, irradia una luz nueva en cada corazón que vibra ansioso por conocerlo. En este Adviento, las celebraciones litúrgicas adquieren un matiz especial cuando hace procesiones, ofrendas, cantos y escuchar la Palabra de Dios.

Hoy nos presenta al Siervo que, Ungido y reservado por Dios, el Mensajero de la Buena Nueva de Salvación:

En la misión de Juan Bautista en el Evangelio aparentemente refleja al Siervo del Profeta Isaías, Juan sin embargo, nos aclara que el es solamente “testigo” y no “actor” de la Buena Nueva anunciada desde el antiguo. Hoy nos invitan a celebrar con alegría la pronta llegada de Salvación. De este anuncio debe nutrirse la comunidad cristiana que vive lo que predica y refleja con sus vidas el anuncio de la Palabra.

TIEMPO DE GRIPE

El Ministerio de Salud recuerda que cada año el 5% al 20% de la población de Estados Unidos contrae la gripe, más de 200,000 personas son hospitalizadas y cerca de 3.000 mueren.
