### HEALING MINISTRY

During Jesus' ministry "he cured many who were sick with various diseases, and he drove out many demons." This is the case in today's Gospel. Jesus fulfills the vision of Psalm 147: "He heals the brokenhearted and binds up their wounds."

Jesus knew, however, that he couldn't possibly heal all the illness in the world. No matter how many people he cured or how many hours he ministered, there always would be more suffering people like Job who craved his healing touch. His primary mission was not to rid the world of all suffering. His "purpose" was to preach the coming of the reign of God that heals, yes, but ultimately transcends and transforms earthly suffering. With Paul, Jesus could have said, "Woe to me if I do not preach" that good news.

### TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

"Last rites" is a persistent but pesky phrase in the Catholic lexicon, and not a particularly useful phrase since it props open the door to misunderstanding. Many Catholics presume it refers to the anointing of the sick, yet there is nothing "last" about it. Clearly, the Church desires anointing to be celebrated fairly early on in the crisis of illness, and not as a last measure. The Rites for the Dying stand apart in the Church's plan, and include two principal rites. The first is viaticum, Latin for "food for the journey," the reception of Holy Communion by a dying person. Even very active and aware Catholics often do not realize that this "last rite" does not require a priest's presence, but can be conducted by a deacon or minister of Holy Communion.

The second "last rite" in the pastoral plan is a prayer called "Commendation of the Dying." Similarly, this does not require the presence of a priest, but can be led by any minister or family member. Too often, we have focused on what only a priest can do, namely anoint, and have forgotten the fullness of liturgical care that the Church desires for its dying faithful. The "last rites" are completely available to us even when a priest is not.

## RELIGIOUS EDUCATION CENTER

Our Religious Education Center was dedicated by Bishop Soto in June of 2013. We have made steady progress since that time in repaying our Diocesan Loan, which we borrowed to complete the construction of the facility. We borrowed: \$1,249,672.89.

Through your pledges and Pink Envelope contributions we have paid accumulated interest and reduced the loan to \$973,336.32, as of January 2015. Thank you for using your treasure to insure that our young people receive a first class education in our faith. We have a long way to go to pay off the loan, but you, the Parish family, have shown that our task is achievable.

## CELEBRATE BLACK HISTORY

### Black American in Music

Louis “Satchmo” Armstrong was introduced to the world during the early years he spent in New Orleans, Louisiana, where he was born into poverty on July 4, 1900 cannot be described as a “lovely pleasure.” Young Louis didn’t know his father and he was taught to play the cornet and bugle by an instructor at a home for boys, where he was placed at the age of 13. When he left the home he played music at every opportunity he had. Blowing his horn with bands in “The Cradle of Jazz” gave him an education few musicians ever get close to.

From New Orleans, Louis went to Chicago to combine his talents with those of another legendary horn-player, King Oliver. At the age of 23, Louis cut his first recordings with Oliver’s Creole Jazz Band, and hundreds of recordings followed as Louis’ fame grew and grew, each one reaffirming his stature as a driving shaping force behind the growth of jazz as an original art form. As much as Louis music fostered global appreciation of jazz, it was his personality and deep humanity that made Louis himself, a global institution. Europe, the Middle East, the Far East, Latin America—wherever he went he was more than merely a great music maker, he was a Living American Legend. For the man was his music, and the music was the man. A magnificent smile, the voice of a man in love with the world, and saying it with words that went with music; a splendid talent that made music soar, to become much more than a series of notes on a sheet of paper.

That smile, that voice, that talent all belonged to Louis Armstrong, the trumpet man called “Satchmo.” When he passed away at the age of 71, on July 6, 1971, he took with him a gift unmatched by any other popular musician the world has ever had the privilege to know. He could play a trumpet like nobody else, he loved his audience and they loved him.

#### MINISTERIO DE SANACION

Durante su ministerio, Jesús “curó a muchos enfermos de diversos males y expulsó a muchos demonios”. Así es el caso en el Evangelio de hoy. Jesús cumple la visión del Salmo 147: “Él sana los corazones destrozados y venda sus heridas.”

Jesús sabía, sin embargo, que nunca podría sanar todas las enfermedades del mundo. Por mucha gente que curara o muchas horas que dedicara al ministerio, siempre habría más personas afligidas como Job, ansiosos de su toque sanador. Su misión principal no era la de erradicar todo sufrimiento del mundo. Su “obligación” era predicar la venida del Reino de Dios que sana, sí, pero en último caso, trasciende y transforma todo sufrimiento humano. Con Pablo, Jesús pudiera decir, “Ay de mí si no anuncio” esa Buena Nueva.

#### PROVERBIOS

La Sabiduría es un tesoro escondido: Acoge mis palabras, hijo mío, guarda mis enseñanzas, que tu oído se abra a la sabiduría, que tu corazón se doblegue a la verdad, apela a la inteligencia y déjate guiar por la razón; busca la sabiduría como el dinero, como un tesoro escondido; entonces penetra en el temor de Yavé y hallaras el conocimiento de Dios. Porque Yave da la sabiduría, de su boca salen el saber y la verdad. (Prov. 2 1-6)

#### TRADICIONES DE NUESTRA FE

Los textos sagrados que componen lo que llamamos Biblia fueron coleccionados, organizados y ordenados durante los primeros cuatrocientos años del cristianismo. Fue durante el Concilio de Cartago (Siglo IV), que finalmente se canonizó (estableció el orden) la Biblia católica. Los textos sagrados de la Biblia se han proclamado a lo largo de los siglos en la celebración eucarística para nutrir la fe de los creyentes. En 1969, la Iglesia católica estableció un nuevo Leccionario conteniendo los textos bíblicos que se proclaman en la liturgia. El Leccionario contiene un gran número de textos de la Escritura, organizados de una manera muy especial a fin de que estos textos sean proclamados en las misas dominicales y en las feriales (entre semana). El Leccionario está organizado de tal manera que si una persona asiste a misa diariamente durante un período de tres años, escuchará casi todos los textos de la Biblia. La proclamación de los Evangelios se realiza mediante ciclos dominicales. Durante el Ciclo A, proclamamos el Evangelio de Mateo; el de Marcos durante el ciclo B y el de Lucas durante el ciclo C. El Evangelio de san Juan se proclama durante la Cuaresma y la Pascua. Así mismo, el capítulo 6 de este Evangelio se incorpora al Ciclo B, que es el de Marcos. El resto del Nuevo Testamento se proclama como segunda lectura, excepto durante la Pascua, mientras que la primera lectura se proclama siempre del Antiguo Testamento, excepto durante la Pascua. No olvidemos el Salmo, que es una respuesta a la Escritura.

#### LOS SIGNOS DE JESUS

En el evangelio narra y exigen la fe de aquellos que lo piden, están los signos de Jesús. La fe nace de la predicación del Evangelio, la Buena Noticia que anuncia la presencia del Señor en el mundo. San Pablo así se lo comunica a los Corintios en la segunda lectura de hoy, “¡Ay de mi si no predico el Evangelio!” La primera lectura nos presenta a Job que declara cuán transitoria es la vida y cuán importante es el Señor en él. En sintonía con este texto, la segunda lectura nos muestra el mejor tesoro de nuestra vida de fe; el Evangelio, el anuncio de la muerte y resurrección de Jesucristo, eje de nuestra existencia y camino de salvación. Se recomienda que los grupos comunitarios, especialmente los jóvenes, dialoguen sobre la palabra de San Pablo y sobre el impacto que la predicación del Evangelio causa en sus vidas. ¿Quiénes a su alrededor proyectan mejor el mensaje del Evangelio, no con palabras si no con acciones?. La fe es un don nos la da Dios por medio de la Gracia por el amor que tiene a sus hijos. Pidamos a Dios que aumente nuestra fe cada día.
